Talking About Nukes

Tips for talking about nuclear weapons with elected officials, writing letters to the editor or posting on social media

- · You don't have to be eloquent or an expert on nuclear weapons
- Talk about your opinions, feelings and hopes for a better future
- Talk about your personal story, impact on your family and community
- Describe your personal concern: "eliminating nuclear weapons is important to me, to my family and our community because..."
- We are not asking elected officials to debate national defense policy. We are asking them to add our voice to national and international efforts to abolish nukes.

National policy has local consequences. Local resolutions make our voices heard!

Talking Points

- The money wasted on nuclear weapons is needed for vital, local human needs.
- Real security is health care, housing, jobs, education, clean water, air and food.
- Nukes are pure waste. They *cannot be used!* The U.S. wastes \$60 billion per year on nukes.
- Our government plans to spend \$1.7 trillion over the next 30 years to rebuild the entire nuclear arsenal, delivery systems and manufacturing capacity.
- Nuclear weapons are not just bigger bombs. They are far more destructive than conventional weapons with disastrous, long lasting consequences.
- Nukes are an environmental disaster. Mining the uranium and making the bombs produces huge amounts of highly toxic, long-lasting substances and waste bi-products.
- Everyone in the world *will be impacted* by even a limited nuclear exchange. Fallout, ash and dust put into the atmosphere will create a "nuclear winter" severely reducing or destroying food production and millions or billions will starve.

A full scale nuclear war would end all human life on earth.

About "Deterrence"

- Just because we didn't blow up the world during the cold war doesn't mean "deterrence" is good policy for the future and a nuclear war can't happen.
- The dangers of nuclear accidents are more likely than the threat of a war. There have been numerous mistakes, human errors, communication failures & near launches of nukes.
- No nation or its people are "secure" as long as nukes exist.
- Nuclear weapons are the ONLY weapons that can actually destroy our country.
- The U.N. Treaty is about ALL nuclear armed nations eliminating nuclear weapons. No one nation is expected to act alone.

Negotiations & Treaties Work. Past arms control agreements successfully reduced the number of nukes from over 80,000 to 13,500. *Abolishing nukes completely is realistic and possible.*

No political, military, economic, ideological or foreign policy goal is worth the costs of a nuclear war.

Abolishing all nuclear weapons is the only way ensure nuclear weapons will never be used or cause a catastrophic accident.
